**"Tree Care and Forest Health"**

Learn the basics of tree care and to recognize the presence of disease, insect infestation and other stress factors. Find out about Integrated Pest Management (IPM); understand what you can do and when to seek professional assistance.

This free walk on May 30 will be lead by Mr. Maurice Dauphin, a member of Merrymeeting Audubon Society. Mr. Dauphin has been birding for 40 forty years, and is an expert birder. He leads these types of walks for the Audubon Society.

Bring binoculars, if you have them, but 2 or 3 can be loaned, dress warmly, and if rain, the rain date is the next day if clear on Sunday, May 31. We will meet at 7:30 am in back of the Bath Police Department, where a bus will take us to Butler Head. The walk will run from 8:00 - 11:00 am. We will be back at the Police Station by 11:30 am. The Bath Community Forestry Committee is sponsoring this walk. Mr. Dauphin says, "Warblers have just arrived and shore birds, and we should see eagles. When the leaves are on the trees it makes it hard to see them, so now is the time."

**"Wildlife Habitat in a Developing Landscape"**

This educational conference will offer information to understand and conserve wildlife habitat. The conference will include local examples of successfully planned habitat protection. Various tools and methods for protecting habitat will be highlighted. Speakers include Ken Elowe from the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, and Gary Donovan, from Champion International Corporation. This conference provides a meeting place for volunteers and professionals involved in the development of our communities, whose work directly or indirectly impacts wildlife habitat. Living with wildlife is part of the Maine way of life. As we develop the landscape, it is important to identify and conserve habitat. Informed local decisions benefit our economy, our communities and our environment.

Municipal officials, staff, and volunteers, landowners, developers will benefit from this conference, as will anyone interested in how we use the landscape. The conference will be held on Saturday, October 24, from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Central Maine Technical College in Auburn. Cost per person is \$25, and includes lunch. ## Managing Backyard Habitat Seminar an Inspiration and Success

The Bath Community Forestry Committee and the Department of Cemeteries and Parks co-sponsored a wonderful Friday evening seminar titled "Managing Backyard Habitat" on March 6, 1998. The speaker, Nancy Coverstone, a University of Maine Extension Educator, outlined the four basic wildlife needs, namely food, water, shelter or cover, and space. Then, she shared marvelous slides which admirably demonstrated the relatively easy manner in which human beings and wildlife, including birds, could share our backyards to the enjoyment of all. Nancy had marvelous freeliterature and research resources to supplement her talk. She emphasized the importance of planning your garden space so that the wildlife does not interfere with the use of the land by its owners. This peaceful coexistence is a fundamental principle of planning community forests as well. One must evaluate the best species for the land given its uses and maximize the potential from those uses. Many people participated in Nancy's talk, which included a viewing of a truly inspirational film known as "The Man who Planted Trees. They surely benefited from her simple and enthusiastic advice. The talk was free, as were the scrumptious refreshments!!

The Bath Community Forestry Committee is looking for donations to upgrade our current DOS version of "Tree Manager™ System" software, by ACRT, Inc., to the current Windows™ version. This computerized record-keeping system allows us to enter and electronically maintain information about our urban forest population. In 1992 an inventory of Bath's urban forest was completed and recorded electronically into a database. This database serves as a management and maintenance tool to promote and preserve the health of our urban forest. The cost of purchasing the more efficient upgrade is \$1500.00. ## The Bath Rotary Club celebrates Arbor Week with a Tree Planting on May 19th

The partnership between the Bath Rotary Club and the Bath Community Forestry Committee continues on Tuesday, May 19, 1998 at noon when the Rotary Club will plant and donate a Turkish Filbert (*Corylus colurna*) to the Bath Community Forestry Committee. The tree will be planted in the Bath Library Park. The Rotarians will plant the tree and have pledged to water and care for it throughout the year. This is an extension of the marvelous support the Bath Rotary has given the Bath Community Forestry Committee since its inception in 1992. The endowment for the Bath Community Forest has been substantially funded by the Bath Rotary Club.

The tree is a non-nut-bearing hybrid. It is a stately tree from southeastern Europe and western Asia. It is very symmetrical and has light brown corky or scaly bark. It is noted as a useful tree for formal avenues, such as that being developed in the Bath Library Park, or as a specimen tree. The Turkish Filbert withstands a range of adverse conditions.

The committee is thrilled to be a beneficiary, once again, of the generous support of the Bath Rotary Club. Please join the Committee and the Club at the Rotary Club to join in the planting and the celebration.
